"Security" has evolved rapidly from a minimal function into the "Security Department"; a business unit.

The security function is also one of the most potentially political functions within the organization. Used appropriately, it can become a pivotal and powerful force in averting losses and recovering missing funds and property. Used inappropriately, however, and it can ruin the organization, its employees and its customers. Understanding the myths and misconceptions about the security function, and about what the Security Officer should actually do for the organization, is as important as understanding the governing regulations themselves.

This workshop provides a logical and strategic model that's designed to help the institution's Board of Directors, senior managers and security personnel understand the true scope of security-related regulations and industry-standard security practices. By understanding the cause and effect relationships involving the creation of an effective security function and risk reduction, the Security Officer may use this model to design and implement a standardized, institution-wide Security Program that meets or exceeds regulatory requirements.
